St. Patrick's Day weekend, March 15 - 18, 2013, we will gather at Mission Bay RV Resort in San Diego (www.missionbayrvresort.com). Sea World, Old Town San Diego, Seaport Village, San Diego Zoo, Balboa Park, Coronado Island and the San Diego harbor are points of interest. There will be plenty of opportunities to eat during this rally. Friday evening we're having a potluck dessert at 7pm. On Saturday evening, we'll celebrate with newlyweds Milo & Janet Prodanovich. September 5 - 12, Bob & Connie Bowers, Jim & June Cheshire and Jim & Stephanie Archer are hosting our week long rally in southwestern Colorado at Bayfield Riverside RV Park (www.pineriverrvcamp.com), 20 miles southeast of Durango. This is a beautiful RV park with big rig friendly sites, lots of grass and shade trees, streams and a pond for fishing. At this time of year, the day time temperature averages 75 degrees and the night time temperature averages 45 degrees. Possible activities include a guided tour of the cliff dwellings at Mesa Verde National Park, a train ride from Durango to Silverton on the narrow gauge railroad, a tour of the narrow gauge train yard, a guided off road drive in the area above Silverton, a melodrama at the historic Strater Hotel in Durango. There is plenty to see and do on the way to and/or from this area. Do plan to spend some extra time visiting the surrounding area. Toward the southwest, stay at Gouldings RV Park and visit Monument Valley, UT. Toward the northwest, stay in Moah, UT and visit Canyonlands and Arches Nat'l Parks. Toward the southeast, ride the Cumbres & Toltec train in Chama, NM then drive on to Taos, Santa Fe and Toward the northeast, stop in Colorado Springs to visit the Air Force Academy, ride the Pikes Peak cog railway, and enjoy the beautiful rock formations at Garden of the Gods city park.



Since some of us were planning on heading to Texas for the Heritage Rally in New Braunfels on October 30th, we decided that the trip would make a great ROLLING RALLY. So *Dale* and *I* have put our heads together along with *Mike & Mike Collins*,

and have come up with the following WARNING: This will be a pretty laid back Rally, light on the scheduled events and heavy on the free time. <u>Another difference is that you can go all the way, one stop or any combination.</u>

Tom Cook is handling the Bridge Walk at Mackinaw, so look for his information on that and Jan Sandmire is handling the Heritage Rally and she'll have registration forms available soon.

We will meet in Viroqua, Wisconsin on **September 6th.** A suggestion is to stop at the famous HOUSE ON THE ROCK for a day en route. No need for reservations in Viroqua, we'll give you directions to the County Park where there are ample sites on a first come basis. Viroqua was highlighted in an ACA Newsletter article http://alpinecoachassociation.com/newsletters/2011-09-ACA.pdf so check it out and let us know when to expect you. Probably find a golf course here, too.

Next we go to Goose Island County Park, only 25



Viroqua and on the Mississippi River. We will get to watch the barge traffic, find a local fish fry and drive back

miles from

to Viroqua for the Vernon County Fair (http://www.vernoncountyfair.com). I am guessing that with all the Amish Crafters in Vernon County it will be well worth a visit.

If you remember the musical The Music Man and RIVER CITY, we will find it when we reach Mason City, Iowa. We will stay in a Municipal Park, also a first come basis where the supply exceeds demand this time of year, and it is right on the river. The historical sites here are many. If you want to spend the day in 1912 style, visit The Music Man Square where you can learn all about Mason City's very own "Music Man" Meredith Wilson who was born here and went on to create famous musicals and songs that are beloved all over the world. This is also home to the Iowa Traction Railroad, one of the few remaining railways that are still using electric locomotives for freight transport.

Next stop is Pella, lowa, which was a Dutch settlement that still has the flavor of Holland. See the wooden shoe making machine, the Glockenspiel, and the working windmill (imported from Holland and assembled on site) which grinds the flour for the local bakeries where we'll all want to stop. We will stay in a Corps of Engineers Park, and we'll give you directions and booking instructions when you let us know you are planning on attending.

Next we will go to Kansas City and stay in an RV Park to be determined. We are planning on a visit to Fort Leavenworth and see this historic Military Post. They have a Memorial to the Buffalo Soldier and a wonderful Museum. We'll do a dinner at an original KC BBQ Joint and have an opportunity to tour historic KC and The Truman Library in nearby Independence.

Staying in Kansas, we'll go across the state to Hutchinson and park at the Kansas State Fairgrounds. Hutchinson is home to the only Salt Mine that allows tourists. http://www.undergroundmuseum.org/index.php We'll go down 650 feet and explore various parts of the mine adjacent to the Museum. It is mind boggling to realize that the mine extends 13 miles under Kansas. We will also visit The Kansas Cosmosphere and Space Center www.cosmo.org with the largest collection of space artifacts outside the Smithsonian, and the largest collection of Soviet space hardware in the Western world; you'll be surrounded by the sights, sounds, and thrills of man's journey to the stars. The Cosmosphere was also recently named one of the 8 Wonders of Reno County, as well as one of the 8 Wonders of Kansas!

Restored by the Cosmosphere, authentic V-1 and V-2 rockets are displayed in the German Gallery and set the stage for the acceleration of rocket development in the 20th century. The Cold War Gallery's display of technology testing, Sputnik, and Sputnik II highlight Russia's early dominance of the space race. And much much more! There may be a Golf Course here, too!

From Kansas our next stop will be Oklahoma City. Visit the Oklahoma City National Memorial in the northern part of Oklahoma City's downtown and the inscription on its eastern gate says, "To honor the victims, survivors, rescuers, and all who were changed forever on April 19, 1995". The outdoor Symbolic Memorial can be visited 24 hours a day for free, and the adjacent Memorial Museum, located in the former Journal Record building damaged by the bombing, can be entered for a small fee. We'll also have a guided tour, with lunch at The National Cowboy & Western Heritage Museum www.nationalcowboymuseum.org/. This is a museum with more than 28,000 Western and American Indian art works and artifacts. The facility also has the world's most extensive collection of American rodeo, photographs, barbed wire, saddlery, and early rodeo trophies. Museum collections focus on preserving and interpreting the heritage of the American West.

We'll also do a lunch or dinner in the Stockyard area, and it is still a working Stockyard.

On to Dallas and Fort Worth where we'll be staying at the North Texas Camp Resort, a Jellystone Park, in Fort Worth. We'll visit the Stockyard Historic District, Billy Bobs and a host of other Dallas sites. Since we're there a week and have access to a great room, look for a BBQ and potluck, Alpine style.

Heading south from Ft. Worth on I- 35 we will stop at the I-35 RV Park in Waco. The Texas Ranger Museum (www.texasranger.org/), along with the Dr. Pepper Museum (www.drpeppermuseum.com) will be great stops before we go to The Homestead Heritage (www.homesteadheritage.com/) for a tour of this unique place and lunch supplied by their farm gardens and dairy. This is an amazing area that many of us have driven through and missed a great place to visit.

The last stop will be in Fredericksburg, Texas in the heart of the Texas Hill Country. Alpiners Barb and Will Rathke are residents here and they have laid out a great visit. We will see the Museum of the Pacific Theatre www.nimitz-museum.org/, go to the diner at the Hangar Hotel (truly one-of-a-kind), and tour and taste the local vineyards. The Lyndon Johnson Ranch and National Park is nearby and not to be missed. Wildseed Farms is a great opportunity to view blooming flower fields and buy Texas flower seeds and other garden items. We will do a dinner at a great German Restaurant.

San Antonio will be our last stop and serve as the Pre Rally for New Braunfels. We will have full hookups at the KOA, just a few miles from the Alamo. We will have 7 days to leisurely tour this historic city.

The Alamo, Cradle of Texas Liberty, should be our first stop; this Mission has become one of the most popular tourist destinations in the United States. You cannot help but be moved as you walk these hallowed halls.

We will lunch together at famous Mi Tierra and then tour the Market Square District and El Mercado.

No visit would be complete without a cruise down the San Antonio River and discover the Riverwalk. It is replete with shops, foliage and boutiques.

An evening poolside party and hors d'ouvres will give us a chance to visit with new friends and catch up with old friends. We will also BBQ one night and enjoy a famous Alpine potluck.

On your own there is a never ending list of attractions. These include the Japanese Sunken Gardens, Mission San Jose, King William Historic District, Gunther House, Fort Sam Houston, The Buckhorn Saloon and Museum, and the La Villita Historic District.

And there is always time for golf at Fort Sam Houston.

Remember, that you can go all the way, one stop or any combination. This will be a leisurely tour of middle America with old friends and the opportunity to make new friends. The goal is to see as much as you want at your own pace and arrive in New Braunfels ready to PARTY!

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RECIPE

"Better than popcorn" finger food.....

12-16 oz plain oyster crackers 1 pkg Ranch Buttermilk Salad dressing mix (dry)

¼ tsp lemon pepper

½ - 1 tsp dill weed

14 tsp garlic powder

34 - 1 cup salad oil

Combine ranch mix and oil; add dill weed, garlic powder and lemon pepper, mix well. Pour over crackers, stir to coat. Spread on a cookie sheet and place in warm oven (250° - 300°) for 15-20 minutes. Serve warm or at room temperature. Enjoy. This "keeps" well.

We recently had a problem with our slides. We were fortunate to be able to finally get the slides to retract, and made our way home. Once home I spent some time trying to troubleshoot the problem before taking it to the repair shop. I learned a whole lot from reading IRV2 and the HWH Service Manual and was able to diagnose the problem. I avoided a trip to the repair shop, and have sent the control box to HWH for repairs. But we dodged a bullet in that we almost could not retract our slides for travel. That might have caused a call to a mobile mechanic for help. But as usual, if you have enough time to research IRV2 you can find answers to problems. But I thought a little heads up article might be worthwhile reading for our members and maybe help you to be prepared in the event this problem strikes when you don't have the time to search IRV2 or call *Engineer Mike!*

Heads up for your consideration

When we were in AZ recently, we had a problem with our slides. Once in a while in the recent past the slides would not retract or extend with the press of the button. But if I pressed it a second time, it would work. Needless to say that was a warning! As we prepared for travel the slides would not retract. I could hear the solenoids click but the pump did not come on. I got lucky, and after 20 pushes or so it finally kicked on, and the front slide came in. But the back slide still would not come in. I pushed the button for the front slide again until the pump kicked on, and was then able to run the back slide in as well. The jacks retracted with no trouble.

After we got home I did some checking, and found that the jacks would not extend now as well. Again I could hear the solenoids click but the pump did not come on. I suspected either the pump relay was bad, or the pump motor was giving up. I was wrong, of course. In reading some postings on IRV2 and the HWH Service Manual troubleshooting procedure, I found out that the HWH 625 con-

trol box had failed. The circuit that is supposed to turn on the pump relay was not functioning. Fortunately mine was not a total system failure like some have experienced. Just one little part of it. But a critical part! The control box was removed and shipped to HWH for repair.

But the reason for this article is that I learned from IRV2 (where else!) that it is relatively easy to bypass the HWH control box to operate the slides as an emergency procedure in the event the box fails. The control box really does not do anything to operate the slides except turn the pump on when needed. The room slide solenoids are NOT controlled by the control box. They are controlled by the switches directly. Someone has written a procedure describing how to do it. It is a heck of a lot easier than trying to wench in the front slide!! I tried the procedure before I removed the control box, and it works beautifully as described. You can even retract the jacks using the procedure was well, as opposed to bleeding the pressure off by opening the solenoid valves.

You might want to take a look at this procedure and carry it with you in the event your HWH control box ever fails. Even if you don't use it yourself, it might help a clueless service technician get you on the road. The emergency procedure is in *Engineer Mike's* Technical Library on the ACA website, as is the HWH 625 Service Manual if you want to do some troubleshooting. Those pretty LED's on the control panel really will tell you some useful things.
